Your Water Supply

- Two consecutive dry years; 2020 was the second-driest year in 90 years
- Only 20 inches of rain fell at Lake Lagunitas in 2020. Current rainfall is tracking at about 40% of historical average for this time of year
- Current reservoir storage capacity:
 - About 50% total storage capacity
 - We typically see an average of 90% storage capacity this time of year



Lake Lagunitas Rain Gauge




Rainfall (in)

Historical Total Reservoir Storage (May 1st)




Projected Reservoir Storage



Actions

- February 16: Marin Water's Board of Directors approved a resolution declaring a drought and asking all customers to voluntarily conserve water
- April 20: Marin Water's Board of Directors declare a water shortage emergency and adopt water use restrictions
- May 04: Marin Water's Board of Directors approve additional irrigation restrictions



New Water Restrictions

- Goal: 40% reduction in overall water use districtwide
 - Spray irrigation limited to two days a week;
 drip irrigation limited to three days a week
 - Covers are required for pools and spas
 - Do not wash vehicles at home, use a carwash that recycles water instead
 - No power washing homes or businesses
 - Do not wash driveways or sidewalks
 - To prevent evaporation, do not water between 9 a.m. and 7 p.m.
 - Garden hoses must have shutoff nozzles



New Water Restrictions

- Gutter flooding is prohibited
- Fix leaks within 48 hours after discovering them
- Beginning May 20, golf course irrigation is restricted to greens and tees
- No watering grass on public medians
- No using potable water for dust control, sewer flushing projects or street cleaning
- No refilling or topping off decorative fountains



New Water Restrictions

- Approach focuses on education
- Ordinance includes a process for variances or exemptions due to hardship, or for health and safety reasons
- Questions or requests for variances should be sent to <u>Variance@MarinWater.org</u>
- Violations would first result in a written warning. Second violations receive a warning and a \$25 fine; subsequent violations receive a fine of \$250

Conservation Tips

- Turn off sprinkler systems and water plants by hand only when necessary
- Replace your lawn with waterefficient landscaping.
- "Smart" irrigation controllers automatically adjust to local weather conditions and landscaping to provide just the right amount of water your plants need.



Conservation Tips

- Use a broom rather than water to clean driveways and sidewalks
- Install water-efficient fixtures and faucet aerators
- Simple adjustments to your daily routine also make a big difference:
 - Turn of the water while brushing your teeth
 - Take shorter showers
 - Only do dishes and laundry when you have a full load
 - Use a bucket in your shower to capture water while you wait for it to get warm

- Lawn Replacement Rebate
 - Convert high water use lawns to water-efficient landscaping
 - \$3 per square-foot throughOctober 2021
 - Or receive free mulching material
- Free sheet mulching service
 - Local non-profit will install mulching materials and cap overhead sprinklers
 - After the drought, the area can be replanted with water-efficient landscaping



- Water Sense Irrigation Controller Rebate
 - \$100 rebate



- Marin Water covers \$100
- Customer cost: \$70 (8-station), \$90 (16-station)
- High-efficiency clothes washer rebate
 - \$100 rebate






- Graywater Laundry-to-Landscape Rebate
 - Reuse water from your washer for irrigation
 - \$100 discount on graywater kits
 - Free educational webinars: May 12 & June 9
- Rain Barrel and Cistern Rebates
 - Reuse rain water for irrigation
 - Up to 50 cents per gallon of storage
 - \$1,000 maximum



- Direct Metering Flume Rebate
 - o Provides real-time data on water
 - Easy to install, and uses Wi-Fi connection
 - Point-of-purchase discount with Flume: Marin Water Pays \$115, customer pays \$50
- Hot Water Recirculating System Rebate
 - Reduces water waste while waiting for the water to get hot
- Pool Cover Rebates
 - o \$100
